Queer	Queer is a term used by those wanting to reject specific labels of romantic orientation, sexual orientation and/or gender identity. It can also be a way of rejecting the perceived norms of the LGBT community (racism, sizeism, ableism etc). Although some LGBT people view the word as a slur, it was reclaimed in the late 80s by the queer community who have embraced it. Trans Transitioning	An umbrella term to describe people whose gender is not the same as, or does not sit comfortably with, the sex they were assigned at birth. A trans boy/man was assigned female at birth and now identifying as male. A trans girl/woman was assigned male at birth and now identifying as female. The steps a trans person may take to live in the gender with which they identify.
